













Household Pulse Survey Total U.S.




Percent of Adults Ages 25 to 44 With Children by Sex and Survey Week Not Working Due to COVID-19 Related Child Care Issues



Online Learning and Paper Resources Provided to School Children by Household Income From May 28-June 2, 2020 (In percent)





Percentage of teachers who said their students were essentially "truant" during Coronavirus-related closures (April 7 & 8)



Percentage of districts leaders who said students' lack of technology access is a major challenge to teaching during Coronavirus-related closures (March 24 & 25)




Percentage of teachers who said they were collecting and returning students work online vs. having families pick up work packets in person (March 24 & 25)




Percentage of teachers who have had families pick up work packets in person:

The Questions Asked...

In the age of COVID, how do you think the role of parents in their children's education has changed?

What resources do you think schools and teachers could provide, if any, to help parents?

Parents and caregivers said....



- Parents are required to be the teacher but they didn't want to be a teacher.
- Children's' responses to a parent are very different from their responses to their teacher (i.e. they won't cry to their teacher but will have tears and push back with parents)
- Younger children and children who are not proficient readers require more one-on-one engagement
- Working parents are often interrupted during their workday by the child which puts a strain on the parent-child relationship.
- Parental concern for physical and mental health of their children being in front of screens for extended periods of time.

Schools are not parental equivalents.


Parents must, no should, participate.

The need for better monitoring of all students online


So Now What?







Make sure your student is prepared for digital days
Teach your student to sign in, practicing completing and turning in homework.
Check for access to hotspots, laptops and power
Ask about school counselors to handle the increased strain
Ask teachers about resources to equip parents to co-teach.
Read over instructions ahead of time, ask for clarification where your student may get stuck
Make it fun for your student. Only you know what your child loves, use it to your advantage!!!
Encourage student to talk to their teacher
If possible, check in with other parents for help and support


